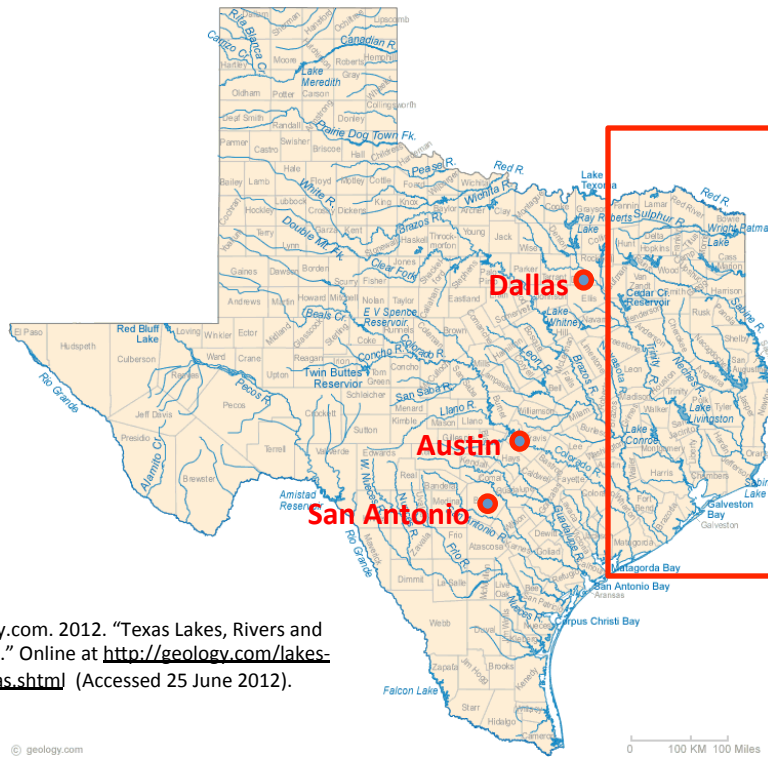

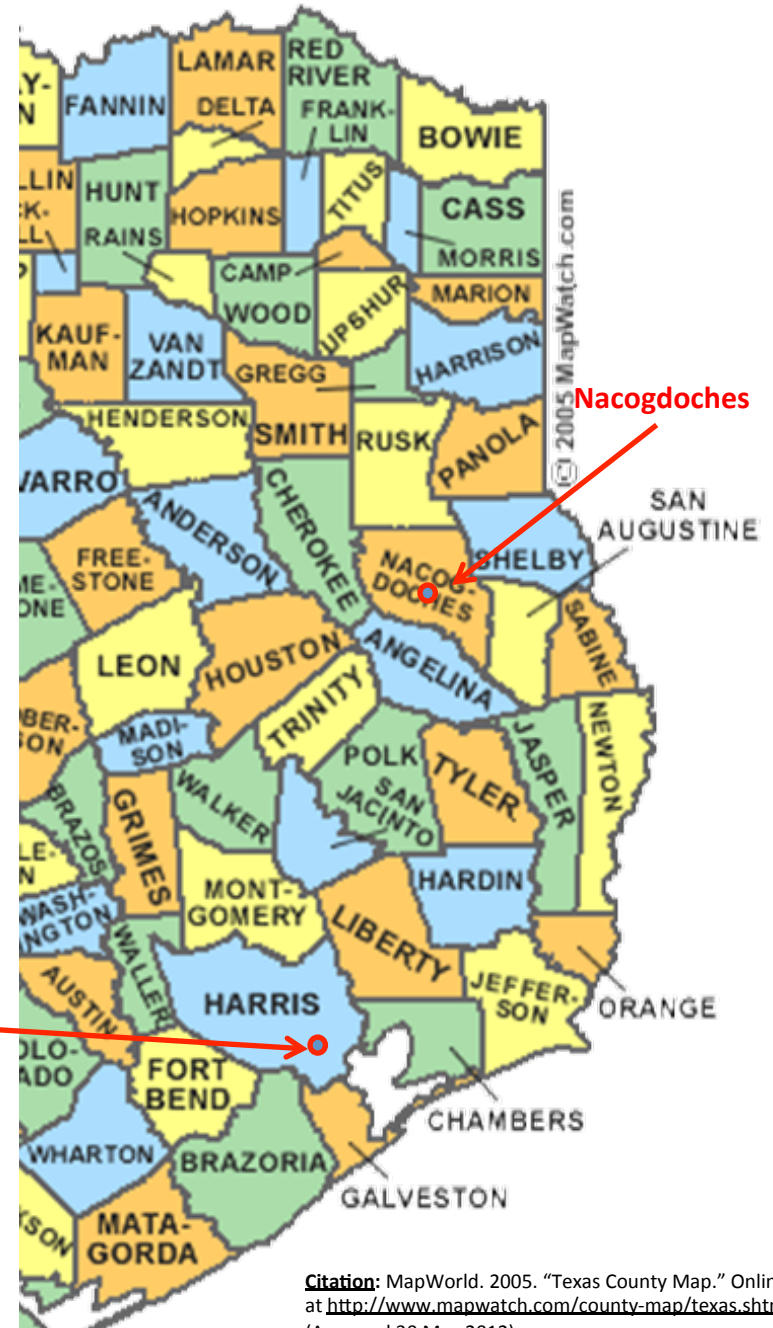

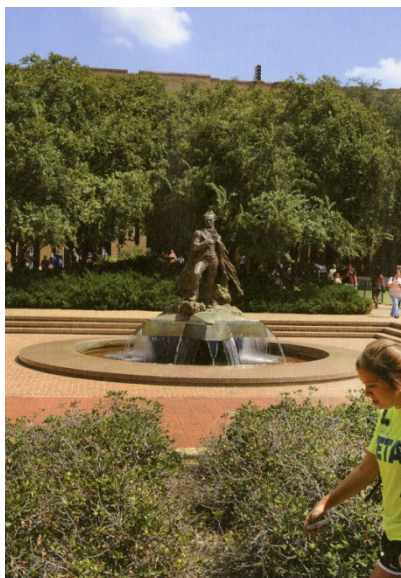

The workshops will not only increase participants' awareness of the importance of disaster and preservation planning, but also encourage networking and cooperation when it comes to planning and implementation.

Workshop 1: Preservation Planning

This workshop looks at the basics of preservation: planning and risk assessment, the nature of specific materials, agents of deterioration, preservation methods, collection storage, and collection display.

Workshop 2: Preservation of Extraordinary Materials

This workshop is an introduction to the preservation of three common archival paper formats: oversize paper artifacts, scrapbooks and photographs. It includes discussion of the history, production and variation within each medium, as well as their associated preservation problems.

Workshop 3: Disaster Planning

This workshop covers emergency preparedness, fire protection, security, integrated pest management, mold, and environmental control. It looks at preventive strategies as well as means to monitor and control these issues if they do occur.

Workshop 4: Disaster Recovery

Disaster recovery focuses on the steps that should be taken following a response to a disaster and the rehabilitation of building and collections. Hands-on salvage of wet collections familiarizes participants with the various salvage techniques employed for different media. Case studies review lessons learned from small emergencies as well as large disasters. This workshop will also feature a discussion of how to sync institutional disaster plans with state and federal disaster procedure. **(This Workshop is limited to 20 participants per session)**

Workshop 5: Public Program

Attendees learn about organizing important family items. Discussion will focus on the preservation of papers, photos, and other family treasures so future generations can appreciate your family's experiences, heritage, and history. Examples will be shown of the safe display, storage, and care of some of the most common items in family collections. Participants are encouraged to bring items for examination and discussion. The same workshop will be presented on both days.

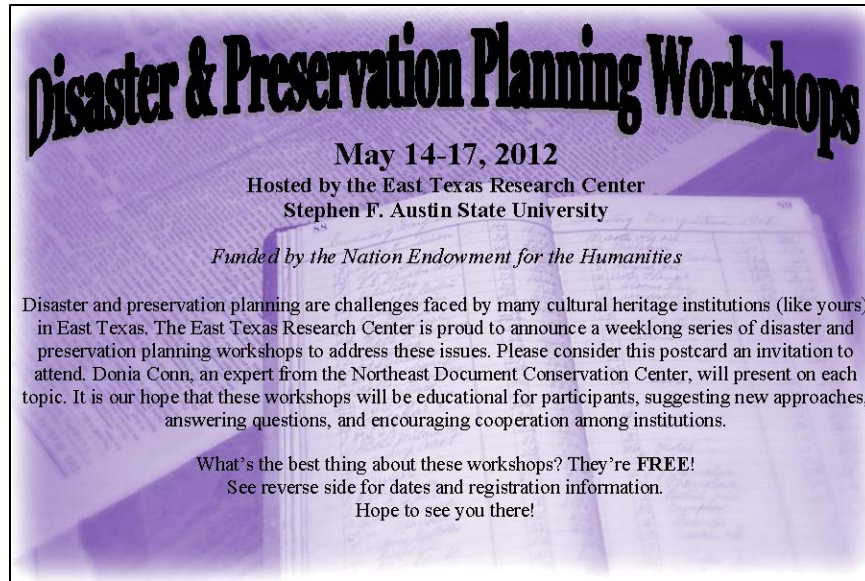
