The Mystery Playwright Behind the Play

Award-winning playwright **Jane Martin** first came to national attention for TALKING WITH..., which premiered at the 1981 Humana Festival at the Actors Theatre of Louisville [KY], and has since been performed around the world, winning a Best Foreign Play award in Germany. Ms. Martin's KEELY AND DU (1993) was nominated for the Pulitzer Prize in drama and won the American Theatre Critics' Association Award for Best New Play in 1994. JACK AND JILL won the American Theatre Critics' Award in 1997. Her other work includes MR. BUNDY, MIDDLE-AGED WHITE GUYS, CEMENTVILLE, VITAL SIGNS and, most recently, ANTON IN SHOW BUSINESS.

But who is "Jane Martin"? Martin is the pseudonym of a playwright whose work for the past 20 years has premiered exclusively at the Actors Theatre of Louisville. All have been directed by the theater's former Artistic Director, Jon Jory. But little else is known about her--even her gender is uncertain (some have suspected it is Jon Jory himself). What is on record is that "Martin" is a Kentucky resident whose identity is known only to director Jory and the theater's administrative director. And while it is possible that "Jane Martin" may be a man, most of her themes deal with women's issues with remarkable sensitivity, depth and insight.

Will the identity of "Jane Martin" ever be known? Says Jory: "People don't sustain anonymity for two decades without a reason." The mystery remains, even as her writing continues to touch and intrigue audiences throughout the world.

ABOUT THE PLAY

Visit first appeared as a live television play on the Goodyear Television Playhouse, May 8, 1955. A revised stage version opened on Broadway February 7, 1957, and ran for 388 performances.

"In 1951 television presented more live dramas (some 400), hired more actors and spent more money (\$25 million plus) than all producers and backers of Broadway shows. . . . [O]ne weekly program was theoretically capable of devouring the entire works of Shakespeare in only a season--and before audiences that would have staggered the Bard. To satisfy the medium's insatiable appetite, ambitious producers and directors . . . encouraged new authors to turn out fresh scripts. . . . [A] few dramatists were launched on brilliant careers, among them Rod Serling (*Requiem for a Heavyweight, Patterns*), Reginald Rose (*Twelve Angry Men*), Gore Vidal (*Visit to a Small Planet*) and Paddy Chayefsky (*Marty, The Bachelor Party*)."

"[D]riven by necessity, I took the plunge into television, the very heart of darkness, and to my surprise found that I liked it . . . [T]elevision [in the 1950s] needed plays by the hundreds. I don't think there has been anything comparable since the Elizabethan theatre, when new plays were turned out with rich abandon to keep resident companies busy . . .

"The idea of *Visit to a Small Planet* was rejected by three television sponsors before the Philco-Goodyear Playhouse bought it. I was told that the advertisers found the premise alarming ... (some had declared the entire conception unwholesomely menacing). . . . With some anxiety, we waited for the roof to fall in; to our very real surprise it did not, and most people were pleased with my gentle heresy."

ARTISTIC STAFF

C.W. BAHS, Producer, is Theatre Department Chair at SFA and formerly held that position at the University of Wyoming. He is a graduate of Bowling Green U. in Ohio, where he was honored as "Outstanding Alumnus." Among his SFA productions have been Merchant of Venice, Man for All Seasons, Madwoman of Chaillot, Glass Menagerie, Murder at the Howard Johnson's, I Do! I Do!, Streetcar Named Desire, King Lear, Miracle Worker and Cabaret.

ALLEN OSTER, Artistic Director/Director--TALKING WITH, is a native of North Dakota. His SFA productions include Macbeth, Medea, Les Liaisons Dangereuses, Chicago, In a Northern Landscape, Effects of Gamma Rays on Man-in-the-Moon Marigolds, Summer and Smoke, Last Night of Ballyhoo and Terra Nova. Professor Oster is Administrator of the Student-Directed Productions program and Director of SFA's High School Summer Theatre Workshop. He was the recipient of the 1996 Teaching Excellence Award for SFASU. He received his MFA in Directing from the University of Utah, and has acted and directed professionally.

ALAN NIELSEN, Marketing Supervisor/Director--VISIT, is Associate Professor of Theatre at SFA and also directs The Original Cast. A published author, playwright and composer/lyricist (four of his plays have been staged in New York), Dr. Nielsen wrote and directed Love Noel & Cole and Nacogdoches Nell for Summer Rep, as well as shows for The Original Cast since 1991. SFA productions include: Major Barbara, Gypsy, Reckless, On the Verge, Into The Woods, Tomfoolery and Moon Over Buffalo. He was named Outstanding Professor in the College of Fine Arts for 1999. A graduate of City University of New York, he is a member of The Dramatists Guild.

JIM WILLIAMS, Director--SHAKESPEARE, has directed and acted in professional theatres in New England, Boston, Philadelphia and New York City. Directing experience includes Good Person of Setzuan at SFA, The Tooth of Crime, A Chorus Line, Miss Julie, Comedy of Errors, 'Night Mother, Hello Dolly, A Piece of My Heart, Carousel and Under Milkwood. In New York, Jim was Artistic Director for Lightning Strikes Theatre Company and Managing Director for the Art & Work Ensemble Theatre Company in Soho. Acting credits include major roles in American Buffalo, The Nerd, Pirates of Penzance and Richard II.

KEVIN J. McCLUSKEY, Costume Designer, holds an MFA from Indiana University, and has worked professionally for Utah Music Theatre, The Post Playhouse and Black Hills Playhouse. Recent designs include King Lear, Accomplice, Into The Woods, Arms & The Man, Ah, Wilderness!, Summer and Smoke, Moon Over Buffalo, Cabaret, Terra Nova and The Good Person of Setzuan. Kevin is active in the Costume Commission of the U.S. Institute of Theatre Technology.

LUIS RAMIREZ, Scenic Designer and Associate Professor of Theatre in scenic and lighting design, earned an MFA degree in scene design from Carnegie Mellon University. He also holds an MA from Wake Forest University and a BFA from the University of Georgia. His professional freelance career as a scenic and lighting designer includes productions at Stage One in Louisville, The Body Politic Theatre in Chicago, The Academy Theatre in Atlanta, Blues City Cultural Center in Memphis and Saltworks Theatre Company in Pittsburgh. He has additional credits as an art director in Chicago, and in television and the exhibit industry. He was previously on the design faculty at the University of Mississippi and at Huntington College in Indiana.

JOYOUS ISRAEL, Lighting Designer, is a Senior from Nacogdoches. Her Lighting Design credits include the Downstage productions of *The Princess and The Rose, Ballerinas Choose Your Weapons, When You Were* and *Miss Julie*. She has also designed lights for the SFA Repertory Dance Company.

STEVEN H. SHIREY, Technical Director, is originally from Florida and holds a BFA from Stephen F. Austin and an MFA in lighting design from USC. At USC he was lighting designer for A Midsummer Night's Dream, On The Verge and Taste of Honey. At SFA he designed Pippin, Tales of the Lost Formicans and wrote, designed and directed Readings of Texts by William S. Burroughs. When he is not busy in the scene shop, Steve enjoys spending time with his seven-year-old daughter, Hannah.

BARBARA BLACKWELL, Costume Shop Supervisor, holds a BA in art from SFA. She has been sewing since the age of six and loves to quilt. She has helped build costumes for many shows including Moon Over Buffalo, Cabaret, Terra Nova, The Good Person of Setzuan, Into The Woods, King Lear, Home Fires and for Summer Rep, The Boys Next Door, Black Comedy and Sea Marks.

STACEY FLORES, Company Manager/Stage Manager -- SHAKESPEARE, is a Senior Theatre major from Bulverde. She has been the Stage Manager for Terra Nova, Moon Over Buffalo, A View From The Bridge, Table Settings and for The Original Cast 2000-2001 (Tomfoolery).

DAVID FOWLER, Sound Engineer/ Master Electrician, is a Senior from Houston. He completed an internship in sound design with Arizona Theatre Company and Kansas City Starlight Theatre. At SFA, he has designed sound for *Moon Over Buffalo* and *Accomplice* and was the Sound Mixer for *Cabaret*.
