Lighting designs are inspired by historical and environmental elements, as well as designs mentioned by the playwright. The colors of the lighting reflect the dingy households and apartments that predominately relied on natural lighting for their establishments.

# Synopsis and Background

Blues for an Alabama Sky is about a family of friends struggling with materialistic themes such as the Great Depression and the economic hardship that came after the Harlem Renaissance. As designers, Blues for an Alabama Sky is a play where it's important to show the black experience during the Great Depression and the Harlem Renaissance, create a space the audience feels they can relate closely to, and help the audience feel the emotion and the characters' need to escape from, or succeed out of, their current environment..


Themes: self-destruction, financial struggle, romance, and the pursuit of hopes and dreams.

#### Costumes

The costumes will aid in showcasing the timeperiod with the silhouettes as accurate as possible, while also playing as reflections of the characters themselves and in turn letting the audience know the kind of person they are.



Delia will wear soft colors like pinks and creams and is more plain. Angel will wear blues and purple and is more bold.

Leland wear browns and blacks and is very neat wile Sam wear greens and is always dressed nice. Guy wears reds and has a dramatic style.
