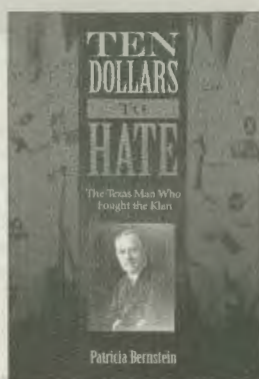
TEN DOLLARS TO HATE

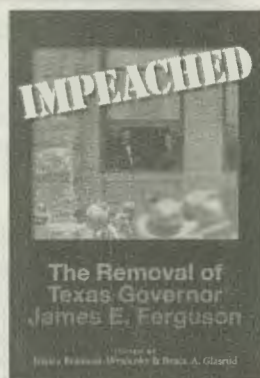

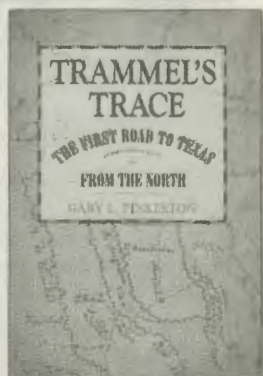
TRAMMEL'S TRACE

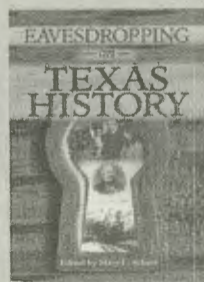
